The intellectual process, b its ver nature, can be distressing, but Wesle an does not necessaril regard actions that are distressing as violations of its codes of conduct.

In accordance, then, with the ideals of academic freedom, ever member of the Wesle an communit should feel that he or she can enter into controvers without fear of being silenced or constrained. This communit s commitment to the free e_{ψ} change of ideas and pursuit of knowledge requires a wide range of protections for speech and e_{ψ} pression, even when no_{ψ} ious or offensive. Belonging to this communit , however, carries with it the responsibilit of e_{ψ} tending respect and openness of mind to others.
