Dear Madeline:

It is imperative that you meet with me for a Conduct Meeting to discuss an incident that occurred on October 12, 2023, in the Ellipse in the Technology Center during the Unity in Support of Israel Event, and your alleged violations of the following standards of the Rockland Community College (RCC) Student Code of Conduct:

1. Standard 1d - Complicity with Others

Complicity with others in violations of this standard.

2. Standard 2a - Discriminatory/Harassing Behavior

Engaging in any behavior that is discriminatory, abusive, or harassing of any individual or group of individuals on the basis of gender, race, color, creed, ethnicity, religion, age, marital status, military status, national origin, sexual orientation, or disability. Prohibited conduct includes, but is not limited to, incidents of bias-related acts of assault or abuse, or actions that create a hostile, offensive, or intimidating learning or working environment. Violations of this standard can occur in-person, over the phone, or via electronic media (e.g. e-mail, text messages, social networks).

3. Standard 4a - Disruptive Behavior

Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly engaging in disruptive behavior that interferes with the educational or administrative operation of the College. Such conduct includes, but is not limited to: conduct which disrupts the peaceable classroom, office or administrative environment, conduct that disrupts any College-sponsored activity (the blocking of an entrance, exit, or access to any College facility, area, road, stairway, and/or walkway); behavior that infringes upon the rights of other members of the College community; and leading or inciting others to disrupt scheduled and/or normal activities on College premises

4. Standard 2c - Intimidation

Intimidation, coercion, stalking (including cyber-stalking), harassment, abusive language, or any other conduct which threatens or endangers the health, safety or well-being of any member of the campus community. Violations of the standard can occur in-person, over the phone, or via electronic media (e.g. e-mail, text messages, social networks).
