BR:What is FIRE?When wasit founded/what is its purpose?

FIRE: e Foundation for Individual Rights in Education was founded in 1999 and is celebrating its ten-year-anni versary. e mission of FIRE is to defend and sustain individual rights at America's colleges and universities. ese rights in clude freedom of speech, legal equality, due process, religious liberty, and-sanc tity of conscience—the essential qualities of individual liberty and dignity. FIRE's core mission is to protect the unprotected and to educate the public and communi ties of concerned Americans about the threats to these rights on our campuses and about the means to preserve them.

BR: Can you explain FIRE's speech code ratings?

FIRE: FIRE de nes a speech code as any campus regulation that punishes, forbids, heavily regulates, or restricts a substantial amount of protected speech, or what would be protected speech-in so ciety at large. is basic de nition is nec essary because colleges rarely label such restrictions as "speech codes" in their handbooks. A "red light" institution has at least one policy that both clearly and substantially restricts freedom of speech.
